



Rental Assistance Works for Minnesota: Keeping Families Housed, Working, and Connected to Their Community

Minnesotans want to live near their work, send their kids to neighborhood schools, and feel safe at home. Federal rental assistance helps make that possible.

More than 100,000 Minnesota households—seniors, families, people with disabilities—rely on it to afford a place to live. Now, proposed federal cuts threaten to take that stability away, putting lives and local economies at risk.




Share of Heads of Households Receiving Assistance:



By ethnicity: 4% Hispanic





In 2023, **federal rental assistance provided \$782 million⁵** to keep more than **100,000 Minnesota households stably housed.**



Why it Matters: Economic Stability and Local Strength

Rental assistance helps Minnesotans stay connected to work, family, and community. With a stable home, people stay healthier, parents keep working, and kids do better in school. It also supports local landlords—especially in rural areas where individual owners play a big role.¹⁰

Keeping people housed is more effective—and far less expensive—than responding after they lose their homes.¹¹




Dear Member of Congress,
